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

From The Revd Denise Binks

March 2024

Dear Friends,

I was reflecting again on the phrase 'between a rock and a hard place'. Sometimes I find myself there either as an individual or with a community of people: it is a very uncomfortable place to be in a situation where you can't see a way through. The Bible, of course is full of examples and the one that instantly comes to mind is the people of Israel who have at last been set free by God from slavery in Egypt only to find themselves trapped (Exodus 14). The Egyptian army are in hot pursuit behind them, the vast Red Sea before them, what should they do now? If they turn back the Egyptians will either kill them or take them back into even more severe slavery, if they go forward, they will surely drown. What does Moses say to them? "Stand firm and see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today" (Exodus 14: 13). I don't blame them for being terrified, forgetting that Moses was the agent of the awesome power of the God of Abraham. God's response it to gently remind them that he is with them; they had trusted him as they daubed the blood of the sacrificed lamb on their doorposts and seen how God had protected them from 'the angel of death' now he calls them to trust him again. Then he tells Moses to place his staff in the ground and amazingly the sea parts-providing a safe place for those who trusted in God to cross, but those who pursued them to try to kill them perished themselves.

There are parallels here with the events of Holy Week. Good Friday and Easter Saturday must have felt very much like a rock and a hard place for the followers of Jesus. They were most likely in deep trauma having witnessed the arrest, flogging and crucifixion of their friend, rabbi, Messiah. They stayed in Jerusalem, but what were they to do next? Then, slowly, on Resurrection Sunday the light began to dawn on their hearts and God's plan is revealed. Sometimes individually, sometimes in groups, Jesus came to them in his risen power. He had beaten death once and for all. The true wonder of what Jesus had done would be revealed more as those who believed in him received the anointing of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost.

In the life of the Circuit, it can sometimes feel that we are in that place between a rock and a hard place; so many of our churches have closed over the past few years and we stand alongside and pray with and for those who have lost their spiritual homes. We continue our discussions

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with other Circuits regarding boundary changes and we feel uncertain about the future and how we will be affected. In all of this we remember the God who parted the Red Sea and saved the people of Israel, the God who loved us so much that he came to suffer and die, whose resurrection power has defeated death once and for all for all who believe, who calls us to stand firm and see what he can do. Many of us will have stories of how he has brought us through difficult times in the past, let us share them with one another and give thanks to God as we trust that he already has a plan and can see a way through even the darkest of times.

We pray for one another, and particularly Lin and the Leadership Team as we face the days ahead, that God will grant us the wisdom, patience, discernment, and courage to follow him into the unknown.



As Dick unravelled the story questioning it's authenticity in so may ways - In Longfellow's poem he speaks of horses neighing as they entered the great inn-yard! So there may be someone reading this that can shed some light on the carol itself – it's origins and why its not in the hymn book.

I write this on the eve of changing the calendar – none of us knows what is in store in the coming year, but as we travel from the old to the new there is someone travelling along with us and we must put our faith and trust in him to guide a strengthen us whatever lies ahead.

POD PROGRESS

Update to end December 2023

The Pod is pretty established in Sherborne now, as we approach our 3rd Birthday in April 2024. We have become very popular for many different reasons, and have been visited over 9000 times.

April 2021 to October 2023	No. of Visits	Bibles taken	Christian CD's & Books taken

November 2023 was a record month with 442 visits. (Over 40 sessions this averages 11 visits EVERY 2 hour session)

We have helped with fundraising for various charities. The Yeovil Breast Cancer Unit Appeal has especially benefitted as we have received donations of jewellery which have generated thousands of pounds at auction. As well as that we have taken £3137 for jewellery displayed in the window, which the hospital have thanked us for. Nearly £2000 was donated last year in 2023.

Recently we have raised £150 for Yeovil Freewheelers Bloodbikes through donations for soft toys, and £250 was able to be raised for the MacMillan Cancer Support charity through a cake sale held at the Pod. Also the 180 pots of Don's honey raised money for VYM! Maureen has her handmade cards at The Pod, fundraising for the Yeatman Hospital, and Janet's cards raised £277 for The Red Bus.

Last year we started getting donations of used white goods and TV's from Marsh's Electrical shop to pass on to those in need, via SHARES and The Rendezvous. This has been a useful link.

Local knitters have continued to bring in beautiful knitted items, totalling 3759 to date! These have been passed on to Hospital Baby Units, Dementia and Stroke Wards, orphanages overseas, The Women's Refuge, and some items went into the boxes for our Shoebox Appeal. The community loved joining in with this appeal again this year where the Pod was a drop off point and base for assembling many of the total 112 Shoeboxes that we sent off.

two minutes silence. It was soon time for the draw to take place and see the delight on faces when their number was called out! It was a very happy occasion and thanks must be given to all those involved in the preparation . $\pounds502$ was raised for Church funds and Yeovil Breast Cancer Unit, plus $\pounds140$ for the stall supporting 'Save the Children'.

Dick Sinden led us on Sunday in a thoughtful address remembering the loss of life in conflict not only in the two world wars, but so many in conflicts past and present. He also reminded us of those in our own town whose lives were cut short when the bomb intended for Westlands exploded over Vicarage Street, taking out the shelter at the back of the church where many were sheltering. This reminded me of my former years, growing up against the background of the bombed school room and the destruction inside until the rebuilding of the hall in the early 50's. We are thankful for those who went before in rebuilding our lovely church as we see it today. The children also had been busy learning of the relevance of the poppies and showed us many ways of remembering in things they had made.

With Advent Sunday looming there was a hive of activity in both our building, decorating, trees going up, those with craft making skills came into their own with some lovely handcrafts telling the Christmas story.

Rev. Kate led us in a challenging service – sorting the treasure from the trash in our lives. The youngsters had been busy making 'mud pies' we were encouraged to break open a pie to find 'treasure' – a glass bead to remind us that in any sort of rubbish in our own lives there is a little gem waiting to enhance not only ourselves but others.

Christmas Lunch followed and what a feast we were given, so a big thank you for all the hard work that went into a very colourful and enjoyable meal, not forgetting the mouth watering pudds! Well done to everyone. Well done too to our friend Beryl who we learnt had received the Mayor's Award for her work in the community.

Yeovil Music Centre have adopted the Quedam premises as their base and the Christmas Concert was well attended, enjoying festive music - he Community Choir leading us in the singing of favourite carols, a most enjoyable evening.

The third Sunday in Advent saw a hub of activity in both buildings. The children took over morning worship with Rev Kate standing in to plug any loopholes! A 'sketch' nativity which told the story of Festive Fred, who went to find the greatest gift! Falling asleep he had this dream of being a shepherd in the fields and so the Christmas story unfolded with the help of a few others including the congregation. Everyone entered into the spirit of how children can tell the story in their own way – to find the greatest gift – well done everyone. We also enjoyed the singing of the Twelve Days of Christmas, with the children holding up cards of the various items. We also learnt from Kate the alternative version a sort of secret code from the early

We were also introduced to 'Prayer Bear' - this little bear is passed round the group at their meetings to encourage and help in prayer time. There was a blessing for the shoe boxes that had been sent off to distant lands - 14 in all - I'm sure when opened those boys and girls faces will 'Light' up at the surprises they will find.

November 11th - we woke to a bright, crisp, sunny autumnal morning, much to the relief of many across the land and especially those organising the fair at Chelston Avenue. coffee and cakes greeted us, with the tables laid out in the church and stalls in the adjacent room - looking for a good read, a puzzle or a gift - you were spoiled for choice. It was well supported and gave people an opportunity to mingle and chat with friends. A hush descended as 11am approached and we observed the

The knitters, like other visitors who bring their donations to the Pod, are so pleased to have a way of helping people, which the Pod provides. The knitters often express how "having someone to knit for" helps their wellbeing. Others are donating bottletops to fundraise for the Air Ambulance, used postage stamps for Weldmar Hospice (which we trim before passing on), used spectacles for Africa, and practical clothing, shoes, blankets and sleeping bags for refugees. These are picked up regularly by SHARES and taken to the distribution centre RAFT in Taunton.

But more than all of this. The Pod is a hub of physical, mental and spiritual support. We are often signposting people to activities and help on offer in our town, as well as having many deep conversations as visitors feel comfortable to do that in the Pod. 431 Christian Books have either been borrowed or found new homes, and 422 Bibles have been picked up at The Pod! Some visitors have also come to us specifically to ask for prayer.

We have made 15 referrals to the Foodbank and our emergency Food Cupboard has been used 62 times. Very soon we will have a Community Fridge in The Pod. which will be managed by Sherborne Town Council. and this is for use of anyone, not just those in need, as the whole idea of it is to lessen food waste. We are perfectly placed in the heart of our town for people to pop in!

We are now thinking about how we can offer more support, deepening relationships, and Kate is planning to run the HOPE Well-Being Course in the Church Hall after Easter, which we could direct people to.

The Pod Volunteers are really fantastic and love being part of this project. There are 22 at the moment, but we welcome more to join the team! Half are from Cheap Street Church and half from other churches, with 2 non churchgoers who are very community minded! We all came together recently to meet each other and discuss how the Pod is getting on, sharing ideas for the way forward. We will be meeting again, together with the Pod Management Team, in February.

I really feel thankful to God for the blessings of this project. Everyone involved, together with the local community, and visitors from other places, have contributed to create something wonderful, and blessed each other in many ways!

At the start we also had the financial blessing of £5000 from an anonymous donor. As we have spent much of that now, we will be needing to fundraise for the project's continuation, our main expense being the electricity bill!

Thank you so much to everyone who is, or has been, part of The Pod, for all your prayers and amazing support!

Again, the volume and quality of the singing made the service all the more enjoyable. The service was followed by refreshments and reminiscing in the Church Hall in the finest Methodist tradition.

Our very last act as a congregation was to host our annual Carols By Candlelight service on 14th December 2023. This was an open invitation to all and was very well attended indeed with even the gallery being brought into use (hopefully those making the effort to climb the stairs did not find it too dusty). On this occasion, the strength of the singing encouraged our organist Gordon Amery to let rip with the full power of our Sweetland Organ creating a truly awe-inspiring sound. Again, in true Methodist spirit, the service was rounded off by serving hot drinks and mince pies all round. It was Christmas after all.

PS. On an inspection walk round the following day, we were relieved not to find any tiles brought down by the previous evening's event. In addition, the collection and donations for refreshments meant that we were able to send £346.15 to Action for Children.

We followed the Advent Liturgy while lighting the candles in the advent ring and also celebrated our Church Anniversary at the beginning of December.






