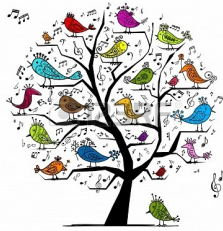

From The Revd Lin Francis

March 2024

Dear Friends,

This time of year reminds me of a friend of mine and his grief. It is the anniversary of this mans son's death. His teenage son committed suicide in a most horrific way. The father was and is still 'lost', and I am sure the mother is too. He looks distracted, is quieter than normal and seems to be operating on remote control. These are the after affects of a sudden tragic death which this family had no way of foreseeing.

I cannot get the face of this man out of my mind's eye. In my mind and in my thinking Jesus comes to the fore. Through Lent we explore our relationship with God. The Bible readings point us towards Jerusalem and to the final days of Jesus' life. Jesus knew of his death, he was constantly preparing his disciples for it. This preparation was painstakingly carried out; three times Jesus predicted his death. The three Synoptic Gospels tell in graphic details of what would happen to him. Note though, that only Luke explains that the disciples didn't understand.

For Jesus life carried on as normal (well as normal as it could), Matthew and Mark find Jesus dealing with two of the disciples jockeying for position and Luke finds him healing the blind beggar. When I think of the man whose son died, it makes me wonder what Jesus looked like, how did he cope with the strain, was he haggard and pale. His friends didn't understand and so often we do not understand people who are bereaved.

The only way we, as Christians get through these type of difficulties is by turning to God in a very special way, wanting and needing his sustaining love and care. Jesus too prayed to his Father.

The whole Easter message is about Christ being arisen, that love is eternal, that faith and hope thrive and that there are no barriers to God's love for us.

Hymn 304 in 'Singing the Faith' voices this far better than I can; have a read and see what I mean.

With some of Jean Murdoch's words: let this Easter season find us recognising that on the dawn of Easter morn came a resurrection, a new hope that grew with the rising sun, that went out to a waiting world... to you and me. Let us live our lives with a resurrection faith and continually shout "Alleluia, Christ is arisen".

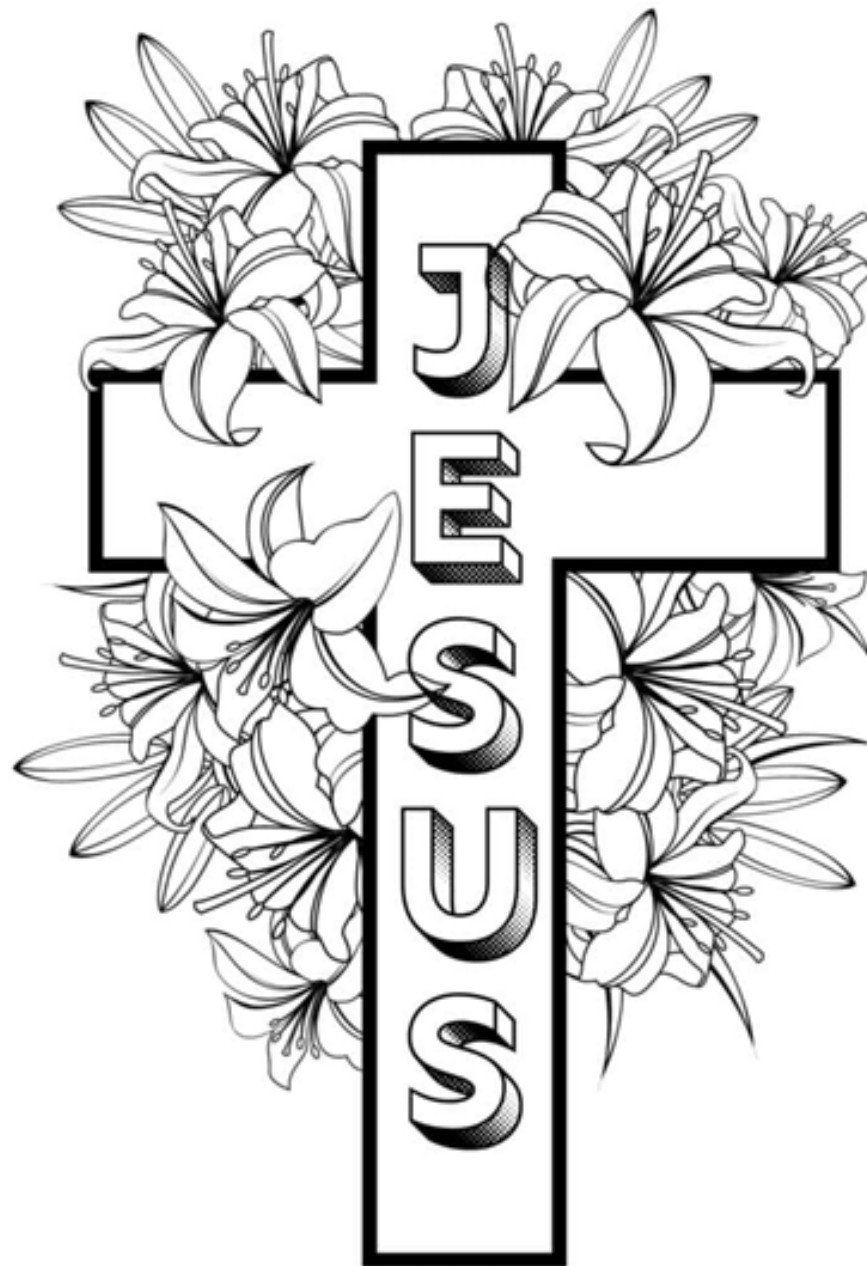

(and the young at heart)



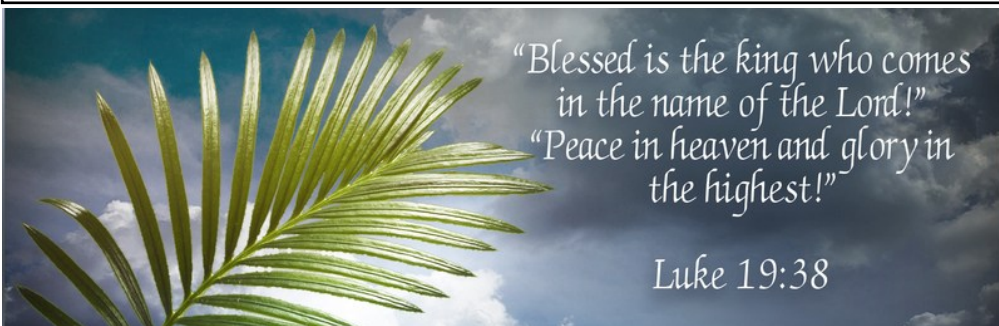

Greetings from Cheap Street Church! At the time of writing this I am just home from a wonderful Covenant Service. For the very first time – as far as I am aware – the service was held at 4pm on a Saturday afternoon. We invited all our friends from Sherborne Churches Together – the Abbey, St. Paul’s, the Catholic Church, the Quakers, Longburton Church, Lillington Church and Reborne! Such a special service for our church and a joy to share it with others as a fabulous start to a Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Lots of good things have been going on in recent months with Sherborne Churches Together, which Kate – our minister - is Chairperson of for a few more months. The Christmas Tree Festival, held in our church, but run by an energetic group from Sherborne Churches Together, was visited by 3,500 people. 33 trees were decorated, 7 Choirs sang and £2800 was raised for charity. This was divided equally between Sherborne Area Refugee Support (SHARES) and The Rendezvous (a charity working with young people which operates from the basement of the church). We are thankful to SCT for running the festival as it requires a good deal of planning and hard work although our church members did a good deal of stewarding.

During the Christmas Tree Festival the church held a Christingle service for the first time in a number of years. The Brownies and Guides, with their leaders, helpers and parents all enjoyed the atmosphere of the service, lit by fairy lights and the Christingle candles. Sadly I can’t share a photo with you because of the youngsters involved, but you can take my word for it that it was magical seeing the young people, with eyes like saucers, holding their candles so carefully and enjoying the sweet treats and singing the Christingle song led by Daniel England.

The Christmas Tree Festival concluded on a windy Saturday with Government weather alerts sounding! The Carol service with Sherborne Town Band just managed to go ahead as thankfully the wind died down at a perfect time. The church was full, with the balcony in use too, and voices were raised, enjoying the familiar carols and the twinkling lights and smell of the Christmas trees. It really got us all in

It was good to show off our lovely building!

Yeovil Music Centre, based at YMC in the Quedam, held their Christmas Concert in December. They gave us a taste of familiar Christmas music as well as Yeovil Community Choir with the rending of carols and songs, and there was the opportunity for us to join in well known carols.

We also hosted the Yeovil Churches Together Carol Service – well supported, led by the Gateway Community Worship Group – a different style to what a lot of us are used to, the Christmas story, carols and readings from another angle – too some of us out of our comfort zone! But reminding us of the overall message of Love, Hope, Peace and Joy to all mankind.

Rev Kate spoke on the forthcoming 24/7 Prayer during January, encouraging us to take up prayer slots – for the life and work here in Yeovil.

At our Sunday morning worship we experienced a ‘pop up’ Nativity play by the children, seen or rather explored through the ‘eyes’ or rather a telescope! of the angels. The various characters in whatever costumes or guises they chose!, with us, the body of the church, joining at certain points of the story, along with singing carols. We then enjoyed a mouthwatering Christmas lunch, so we say a very big ‘thankyou’ for all the hard work in the preparation, setting up the festive tables and services, not forgetting the mouthwatering puddings. Well done everyone!

The following Sunday, communion was led by Rev Judy who gave her thoughts into the special relationship between Mary and Elizabeth and the babies they were carrying, who would shape and change the world.

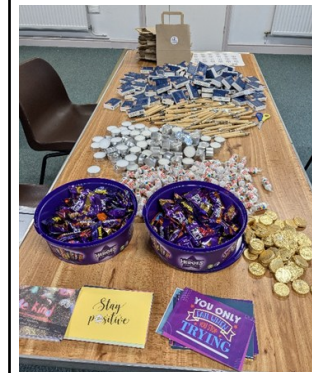


With the pews now having been removed from YMC in the Quedam, the space is ideal for many different events.

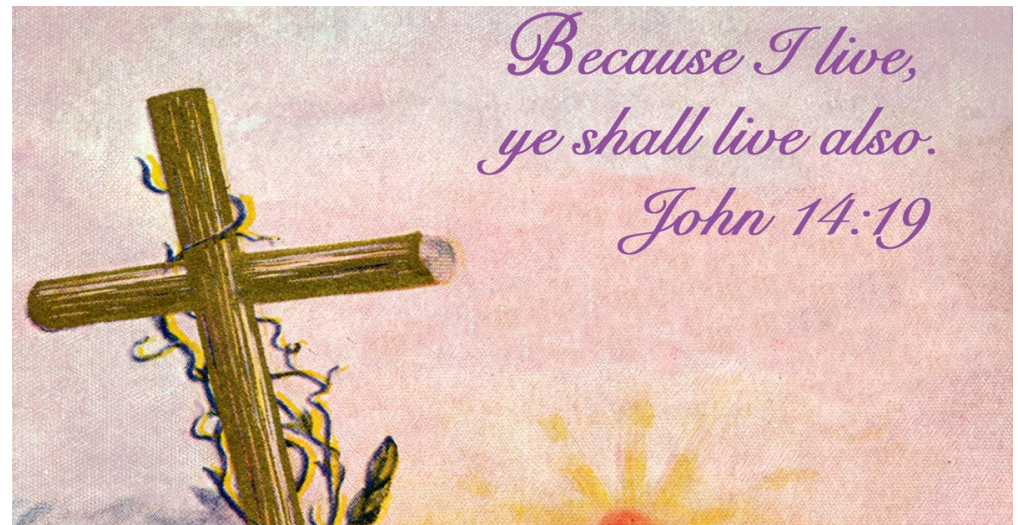
the mood for our own church Christmas celebrations a couple of weeks later.

- Never leave items on charge when you are sleeping or when you are not at home.
- Don't overload sockets.
- Regularly check for frayed or worn cables and wires.
- Buy your electrical chargers from a reputable source.
